

Dear Manes R-V Families: (2nd Grade)

The Manes R-V School District has been granted approval to offer Alternative Methods of Instruction (AMI Days). This plan allows the opportunity for ALL Manes R-V students to be engaged in meaningful lessons of learning on days of inclement weather or emergency days when school is not in regular session.

Each student will be given a packet to keep at home to compete on the days that are AMI days when school is cancelled. These packets are **extremely important and MUST BE taken care of.** Students will complete the AMI days as assigned for each day missed...For example, if the students are out of school two or more days for snow, then the student would need to complete AMI Day 1 for the first day and AMI 2 for the second day. ALL AMI work will be due within two days after school resumes. This pattern will continue for each AMI days missed. If any student has not completed their work for any of the days missed then that student will be counted "absent" for each day work is incomplete.

(If for any reason the AMI packet is lost the class assignments will be posted on the school website)

IMPORTANT POINTS TO REMEMBER FOR AMI DAYS:

- Students will NOT attend school on an AMI day. All students will have assigned work to be completed at home on these days.
- AMI days count as instructional days and do not have to be made up at the end of the school year.
- Students who do not complete the work will be marked absent for the related AMI day AND will receive a zero grade.

DOLPHINS

A dolphin is a warm-blooded mammal that lives in the ocean. Dolphins give birth to babies that are called calves. They also breath oxygen. A dolphin must live near the surface where it can breathe air. Dolphins are known to be vocal and social animals. They swim in pods where they come together with their mates to travel. Dolphins have a dorsal fin on their back, two fins on their side, and a tail. They also have a blowhole on top of their body. Their tail is horizontal and is used to swim in an up-and-down motion. A dolphin will eat things like fish, crustaceans, squid and shrimp.

SHARKS


Sharks are cold-blooded fish that live in the ocean. They spend their whole lives deep underwater. Like other fish, sharks have gills to remove oxygen from the environment.
